## Responding to the reading

In today's reading from Luke 14, we find Jesus doing something very ordinary, something he does regularly throughout his earthly ministry: sharing a meal. But, as often happens when Jesus is at the table, the moment becomes anything but ordinary.

He's watching the guests carefully choose the best seats, the places of honour. And then he offers a story that turns the whole idea of honour and status on its head.

Jesus challenges his listeners to take the lower seat, to let someone else lift them up. And then he goes even further: when you are the host, he says, don't just invite the people who can repay you: your friends, family, or wealthy neighbours. Invite the poor, the outcast, the forgotten. Invite those who can't repay you. Then you will be blessed.

This isn't just dinner party advice. It's a vision of God's kingdom. In a world where status often defines worth, Jesus invites us into something radically different: a table shaped by humility, grace, and welcome.

This message reminds us that the heart of discipleship isn't about climbing to the top or surrounding ourselves with people like us. It's about opening our lives, and our tables, to those who are often left out. It's about making room where others would close the door.

Jesus isn't against honour, but he redefines it. True honour, he says, comes not from recognition or power, but from living out God's justice and love. The kind of honour that counts in God's kingdom is quiet, generous, and unselfish. It lifts others up. It doesn't ask, 'What can I get from this relationship?' but rather, 'What can I give?'

And there's grace in this, too. Because when we stop grasping for the best seat, we're free. Free to show up with honesty and humility. Free to honour others without needing to be noticed ourselves. Free to become hosts of a bigger, more generous table.

So today, reflect on this:

- Where are you being invited to take the lower seat, not out of shame, but in solidarity and love?
- Who might be missing from your table, literally or figuratively?
- How can you live more generously, without expecting anything in return?

Discipleship isn't always glamorous. But it's beautiful. It looks like humility, hospitality, and hope.

May we keep building tables where all are welcome, and honour is given not to the powerful, but to the kind.

Thank you for all you have blessed me with, and sorry for all the times I take those blessings for granted.  
Help me to be grateful today, and every day.  
Amen.

## Friday 5<sup>th</sup> September

- Today is the UN's International Day of Charity – celebrating all the work that the voluntary and charitable sector achieves all around the world.
- Today, we invite you to pray for charities known to you, and those who work, volunteer and give to make their work possible and help contribute to making society, and the world, a better place.
