Responding to the reading

In Luke 15:1–10, we find Jesus doing what he often does best: turning expectations upside down through stories. The religious leaders are grumbling because Jesus is spending time with people they consider sinners and outsiders. And so, he tells them two short parables: one about a lost sheep, and another about a lost coin.

In both stories, something precious goes missing. A sheep wanders off. A coin is misplaced. And in both cases, the response is not apathy or blame: it's a passionate search. The shepherd leaves the ninety-nine sheep to go after the one that is lost. The woman lights a lamp, sweeps the house, and searches carefully until she finds her missing coin. And when do they succeed? They don't just move on, they throw a party. They gather others to share in their joy.

Jesus tells us: This is what God is like.

God isn't passive or indifferent. God doesn't shame or scold. God notices what's missing and goes after it with care and persistence. And when that which is lost is found, God rejoices—not quietly, but extravagantly.

For those of us seeking to follow Jesus, these stories speak powerfully. They remind us that no one is beyond the reach of grace. That God's love is not reserved for the few who

"get it right," but extends endlessly to those who wander, struggle, doubt, or are pushed to the edges. And not only that, these parables invite us to take part in this divine pattern of seeking, including, and celebrating.

Discipleship, then, is not just about personal piety. It's about joining the search. It means opening our hearts and our communities to those who feel forgotten, overlooked, or lost. It means noticing who's missing from the table, and going out to find them—not out of obligation, but out of love.

And it also means recognising the times when we are the ones who are lost—emotionally, spiritually, or socially—and trusting that God will not give up on us either. God's love is not dependent on our performance, but on our belovedness.

So today, ask yourself:

- Who in my life or community might be feeling lost or left out, and how can I reflect God's persistent love toward them?
- Where have I felt lost in my own journey, and how might I receive the joy of being found?
- What does it look like to be a person who throws parties for grace rather than keeps score?

May we be bold enough to seek, humble enough to be found, and joyful enough to celebrate the wideness of God's love.

- Thank you, Lord, for their patience and service.

Friday 19th September

- At the end of this week, I give you thanks, O God, for the little glimpses of glory across the last few days. Amongst all that has happened, I take a few moments to notice my own gratitude and to give you the praise and the glory.
- Thank you Lord, Amen.

Saturday 20th September

Today, let your prayers be for all involved in providing humanitarian aid – particularly where they are putting their own lives at risk to help those in need after an emergency or war. Perhaps there are some particular organisations or people you know involved in this work, hold them in prayer today and consider making contact with them to let them know you are in their thoughts and prayers.
